Project rationale	 Project Rationale: Late onset Pompe disease (LOPD) is a rare, progressive disorder affecting muscle and respiratory function due to acid α-glucosidase (GAA) deficiency. Holistic and consistent monitoring is crucial in a progressive disease such as LOPD to enable better data collection and inform treatment decisions. Two new ERT medicines are now available, requiring the service to adapt. Salford, the UK's largest Pompe specialist centre, currently has only one physiotherapist for inherited metabolic services. More patients need to be seen, and more frequent in-person appointments are required, but current capacity is limited.
